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
Hi, My name is Matt.

Sadly, I couldn't find it and the money invested was lost. It was a pretty painful and humbling experience.






There is a cost to any treasure hunt.

Mel Fisher found one of the greatest treasures of all time when his crew located the sunken Spanish galleon Atocha in 1975. But his search cost him fifteen years of his life, millions of dollars, and the deaths of his eldest son and daughter-in-law.



My failed search for gold taught me a couple of hard lessons:



This left a mark on my soul

and got me thinking about treasures.

Then I remembered:

When I was 19, my idea of a treasure was pretty simple. I wanted a Camaro Z/28. I imagined myself driving it and how others would see me in it.

So I worked, saved up and found a two-year-old Z/28.

It was a gorgeous silver and black. I got my keys and drove off.



To my great disappointment, no one even noticed or cared what car I was driving.

I had tried to forget that, but it came rushing back to me as I thought about the search for treasures.

Slowly, ever so slowly, I realised what I wanted was a treasure worthy of the hunt.



It took me a long time to realise that I'd been hunting my whole life for something that would capture my heart. Sure, I wanted the gold for me, but I also wanted it to change the world.

I realised:

The pain sharpened my focus and I wanted to understand myself better and why I needed to hunt.



I realised another form of treasure hunting is equally challenging.

I don't want to live a meaningless life.

It's two sides of the same coin.

I am reminded of Solomon's despair in his own treasure hunt.



Meaning is:



The language the heart speaks.

For me, a meaningless life is a life of insignificance.

Dictionary.com Insignificant:

- Unimportant, trifling, or petty.
- *Too small to be important.
- *Of no consequence, influence or distinction.
- * Without weight of character; contemptible.
- Without meaning; meaningless:

The first hint

Whether its a treasure hunt or avoiding a meaningless life:

It's a struggle with value.

The heart finds its place only when it knows the values involved.



It may sound like I don't want to use the mind or that it is "separate" from the heart.

I have found in my struggle that there is more to me than just a "mind" and the heart represents that.

So when I am struggling with issues of the heart, I am including the mind's vitally important support work needed to get it clear.

God makes His desire for our heart very clear.

The Lord searches for those whose heart is completely His.


I will find God if I search for Him with all my heart...



Oh that they had such a heart in them...

I am to love God with all my heart...





Hours and hours of reading and heartwork gave me a very simple principle of how the heartworks:



When my heart sees something of greater value, it says to me, choose this over something of lesser value.

Let me slow down here as this was a

revelation to me.

Let me explain it in a practical way.

I live in Singapore.
As I have traveled around the globe,
I've had to deal with



Different currencies.



You can choose one or the other "bill" which would you choose?



Silly question, right!



The point is, as soon as you see a greater value, your heart says to you, "Choose that."



Now, which one would you choose?



Slow down...

Notice your heart (and mind) is wrestling with the choice.



Why?

Because until the value of the currency is clear, you struggle to make a decision.

It feels like a:

Chancy
Risky
Scary
Vulnerable
Potentially embarrassing...

...choice when I don't know the value.

It gets complicated when you know they have the appearance of the same value



Now, which one would you choose?



Gentle reminder:
This is not a foreign exchange class.



This is to help you see that the decisions from the heart, where you are...



All in require a clear understanding of the value involved.

I am not trying to figure out what values to choose, as in which currency.

I am trying to figure out how the heart works.

My heart needs clarity of value to understand the meaning of something.

Until the value of the choice is clear, the heart will not own the choice it must make.





How does my heart figure out what has value?

Here are the key areas that stood out to me



The more rare something is, the more value it has.

How beautiful is it?



The more beautiful something is to me. The more value it has?


What is the quality/purity of it?

The more long lasting and whole or untainted something is, the more value it has to me.

How badly do I need/want it?

The more I need or want something the greater the value of it is to me

Confession time:
Sometimes its really hard
to admit the difference
between a need and a want





Just to cross our galaxy it would take me 75,000 years traveling at the speed of light. (186,000 miles per second.)


And that would only be the first second of a year long journey into our universe.

In my smallness,

I find it very hard to discern

the true value of things.





When I consider Your heavens, the work of Your fingers,
The moon and the stars which You have ordained;
What is man that You take thought of him,
And the son of man that You care for him?

Psalm 8:3-4



Considering the vastness of the universe and God, it feels like the deepest longings of my heart will never be answered.

In these times, I feel lonely, even desperate.



WE NEED HELP!

I found some answers in an unexpected place—
the Bible's book of Job. A story about suffering and sorrow.



Job 28:1-11 (My summary)

Wow, look at all these things humanity can do. We are amazing at finding things of value hidden in this earth.

Job 28:12-13a

But where can wisdom be found?
And where is the place of understanding?
Man does not know its value.



God cuts through all the "glory" of humanity and gets right to the issue. If we don't know something value, we are lost.

When I stand back and reflect:

When I look at the "treasures" I have sought I realise:

I am easily seduced by shiny objects.

I am distracted by sex as if it is all that matters.

I seek to fill my fear of weakness with any form of power I can find.

Imagine living your whole life for one purpose or value.

Example:

My mining adventure. Imagine I got more and more engaged and spent my whole life mining as much gold as I could.



Now imagine me dragging all the gold I have gathered from my life to heaven with me.

As I walk into Heaven. I see the gate made out of one pearl

I see the streets paved with gold and I look at the values I have lived by.

What would I be thinking or feeling as I walked before God to defend my heart?

²⁷ Then He saw it and declared it;


He established it and also searched it out.

'Behold, the fear of the Lord, that is wisdom;


And to depart from evil is understanding.'





Sorry, let me slow down. I am searching the universe and just pushing on.


I am a teacher at heart and when I get focused on an issue I am struggling to understand, I sometimes forget to breath...




Remind me: What are we searching for?

Matthew 13:44-46


"The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure hidden in the field, which a man found and hid again; and from joy over it he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field.

Philippians 3:8 More than that. I count all things to be loss in view of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and count them but rubbish so that I may gain Christ,


Paul shares his heart's revelation of value and makes it clear what his choice is.




Paul recognized that we would struggle valuing ourselves because of our unrighteousness.

He knew the key was getting the church to recognize that our individual value is fully restored in Jesus. He uses a simple expression to help us understand:





If I may state the obvious — "Worthy" is a big time value word.
Once we get His value, we live it out in our lives.





How can I know God's will and live in a worthy manner?

For years this relentless question nibbled at my mind like the swarms of mosquitoes I encountered while working in Canada.

It took me years to realise this was not only a question for the mind. but it was a question for my heart.



The answer was so simple as to be embarrassing.

Ready for it?

To trust God with my whole heart and to live like He is worthy of my life in everything I do.

Then do whatever I have the faith for.

The Final Revelation

The things we have valued most in this life will be fully exposed on that great day when the angel shouts, "Who is worthy to open the book and to break its seals?"

The only one worthy to represent us before God the Father is Jesus, the Lamb of God.

The final "Judgement," is the values of the universe laid bare for all to see.

Including God's




Revelation 4:9-11
